

# Vendor Committe Updates by Judy Goodnow

### The Vendor Scrub is Finished!

Every two years, the Vendor Committee, along with other Avenidas Village volunteers, call all the vendors listed in our screened vendor list. This involves about 150 vendors. We do this to make sure our information for each vendor is accurate. Now that our crew has contacted all the vendors, we will be updating the list with any changes that we've learned about.

The Committee also looks at the member reviews and may even remove a vendor from the list if they receive only negative feedback. This is why your input is so important—it helps us keep our list current and useful for everyone. So please leave an online review after using one of the vendors. Not sure how to do that? Contact the Village Office at 650-389-5405 and they will help you learn how!

We believe that our extensive list offers many services you may find helpful. For example, there are 13 different vendors offering financial services, eight different agencies who specialize in home care, along with many vendors to help with home maintenance. These companies are recommended and screened! For example, I recently hired Tom Rawson at Z-Best Window Cleaning. WOW! He did a terrific job and the cost was reasonable.

Using our online vendor list is EASY. On the opening Avenidas Village Web page, look in the top right section for "Find Vendors." Click the link and it will take you to the different vendor categories. If you need help finding a vendor or have trouble using the online list, call the Village office! Village staff can also guide you to possible service providers.

We are always trying to improve our vendor list—and your experience with the list. Don't hesitate to make suggestions. You can contact the Vendor Committee or the Village office with your ideas. Most important: USE THE LIST! Also: Leave a review!

- Do not bring junk mail or magazines, non-sensitive materials, old utility bills, etc...
- How much can you bring? 4 6 grocery size bags from any one person or household is about average.
- Plastic bags? You can bring stuff in plastic, but will be asked to take the plastic home with you.
- It is not necessary to remove staples from documents.
- 3-Ring binders are not acceptable.
- No phone books, paperback books, etc.
- If you bring items in a cardboard box, you will take the box back with you. The shred truck can not take boxes.
- Paper bags can be shredded we can assist you with emptying bags if you wish to reuse them.

# Village-Sponsored Film Screenings: "Join or Die"

Many of you probably noticed that Avenidas Village recently sponsored and promoted two special screenings of an award-winning documentary called "Join or Die". The film highlights the work of Robert Putnam, a distinguished social scientist who has spent his entire career examining the root causes of what makes a civil society successful and what can cause it to fail.

Best known for his book, "Bowling Alone: The Collapse and Revival of American Community," Putnam emphasizes the critical importance of small-scale community connections and social capital as the key elements in a healthy society and democracy.

Because the film's message is very supportive of organizations like Avenidas Village but is not yet available through public channels, we decided to organize a couple of private screenings at Avenidas. Working very closely with Michelle Shinseki, the Avenidas VP of Marketing and Communications, we promoted the screenings through a carefully planned outreach campaign that included such things as a weekend and a weekday screening, extensive coverage in Avenidas' widely distributed emails, print ads with QR codes for

registration in the Palo Alto Weekly and the Daily Post, boosted Facebook postings, and flyers distributed to numerous local churches.

The two screenings attracted an audience of about 70 people, including interested Village members. Although the screenings were not used to actively "market" the Village, our hope

is that many of the attendees will want to learn more about the ways in which Avenidas Village can provide many of the benefits of rich community connections to its members. All non-Village members who registered will be invited to attend one of our upcoming social gatherings for prospective members, which are held

every few weeks.

# March 22 Vistas: "What Nature Wants You to Know About Play" with Villager Tony Christopher

Play is any activity that brings you joy or deep satisfaction. Play and being playful is not at all frivolous; it is certainly not solely the domain of children and the more we play the better our lives can be. Regardless of one's age, play is important to our well-being – physical, social and emotional. Scientifically, when someone plays, their brains "light up" – establishing neural pathways that activate the pursuit of intrinsically motivated actions which in turn create authentic pleasure and joy. Over time this leads to increased



self-esteem, emotional resilience, and communal belonging while also mitigating the build up of stress, and fostering physical activity.

**Tony Chistopher** has a deep, passionate belief that play is important in every stage of life. He has often been playful as he led teams in developing virtual communities, knowledge management and other online services for Fujitsu, Apple Computer, Cisco, NASA, the FAA and Stanford University. Early in the personal computer era, he was the founding product manager for AppleLink, Apple Computer's visionary extranet service that connected its employees with its dealers and developers. He retired from salaried work to devote his time to the role of executive director of the National Institute for Play.

# **April 23 Vistas: "Preventing the Spread of Nuclear Weapons: A History" with Villager Leonard Weiss**

This talk provides a narrative history of the background, development, and timeline of some of the laws and institutions surrounding the effort to prevent or contain the spread of nuclear weapons. Briefly covered, in addition, are the discovery of nuclear fission, the development of the Atomic and Hydrogen Bombs, and the status of nuclear programs in a few countries that currently drive the news cycle on this issue.

**Leonard Weiss** is a visiting scholar at Stanford University's Center for International Security and Cooperation (CISAC). He is also a national advisory board member of the Center for Arms control and Non-Proliferation in Washington, DC. For more than two decades he worked for Senator John Glenn as the staff director of both the Senate Subcommittee on Energy and Nuclear Proliferation and the Committee on Governmental Affairs. He was the chief architect of the Nuclear Nonproliferation Act of 1978 and legislation that created the Defense Nuclear Facilities Safety Board.
